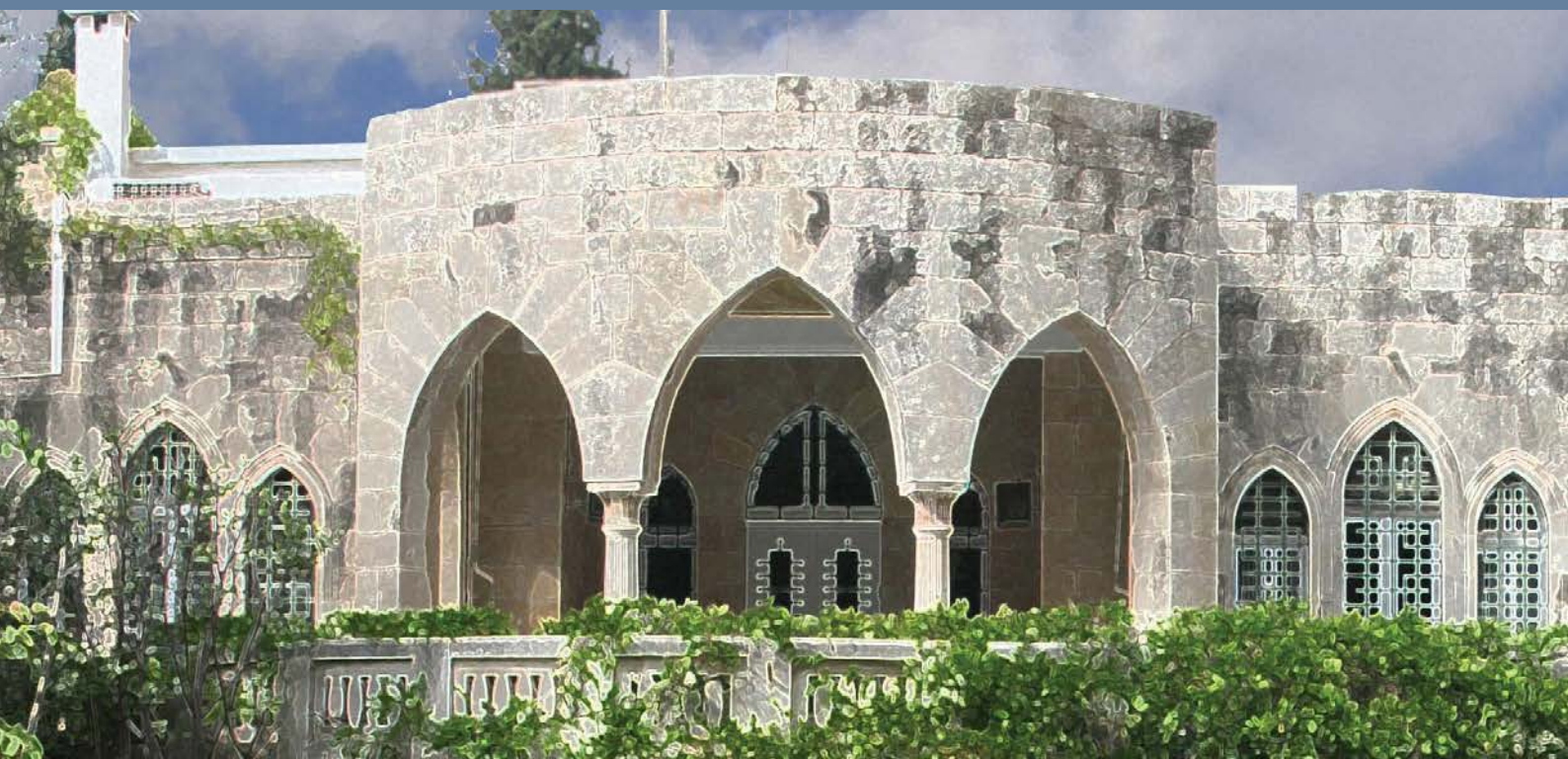

Letter from the President

Dear Family and Friends of the Jerusalem Center,

It is a pleasure to wish you a New Year of blessings and good health.

This has been a fruitful year at the Jerusalem Center. We have launched pathbreaking applied diplomacy initiatives to fight the Apartheid libel together with the U.S.-based Institute for Black Solidarity with Israel and major Black American community leaders. We have signed agreements and are closely cooperating with policy institutes in the UAE, Bahrain, and Morocco on combatting shared national security threats, particularly from the Iranian regime. We have issued monographs and held briefings and consultations further exposing Palestinian Authority financial incentives for terrorists and their families. Finally, we heartily congratulate Jerusalem Center scholar Fiamma Nirenstein on the occasion of the Center's recent publication of her latest book, ***Jewish Lives Matter***, that for the first time calls the international human rights community to account for weaponizing human rights against Israel and offers a path to reclaim the global human rights agenda.

The unprecedented challenges the Jerusalem Center, Israel, and the Jewish people confront has brought me to decide to dedicate 100% of my time to these major issues. In that regard, after 22 years I will be stepping back from my daily responsibilities as President of the Jerusalem Center. As of November 30, 2022, I will be stepping into the position of the Jerusalem Center's President Emeritus. Our Board of Directors is in the process of choosing my successor, who will be highly qualified in both professional abilities and personal qualities.

In my over two decades as President of the Jerusalem Center, it has been a privilege to lead this institute to a position of Israeli and international prominence, leading on critical issues surrounding Israel's national security and its rights-based standing in the Middle East and the West. Our record is reflected in this report.

Our top researchers and analysts continue to guide path-breaking initiatives such as:

- Combatting Antisemitism and Apartheid Annihilationism – from Iran's Genocidal Threat, in International Fora, and on University Campuses

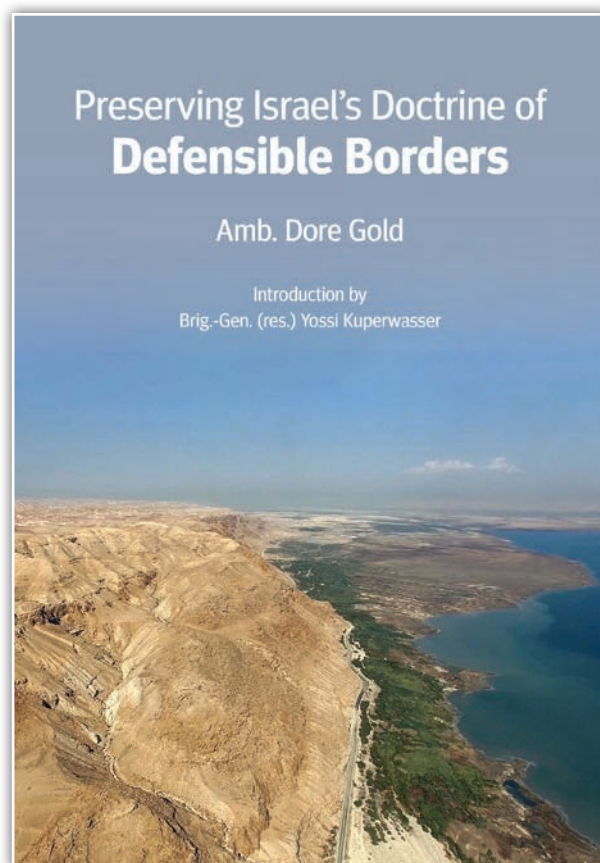


Ambassador Dore Gold, president of the Jerusalem Center for Public Affairs, and Brig.-Gen. (res.) Yossi Kuperwasser, former head of the Research Division of IDF Military Intelligence, submitted to the President of Israel, Isaac Herzog, on August 18, 2022, the latest, updated version of the Jerusalem Center study *Preserving Israel's Doctrine of Defensible Borders*, after the conclusion of Operation Breaking Dawn against Islamic Jihad in Gaza.

Preserving Israel's Doctrine of Defensible Borders is a major security and public diplomacy initiative that analyzes the threats now posed to Israel by terrorism, as well as Israel's current territorial requirements, with special emphasis on Judea and Samaria, which is strategically vital for Israel to retain if it is to fulfill its existing security and defense needs.

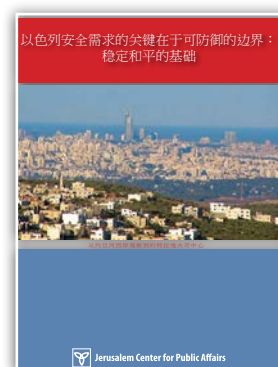
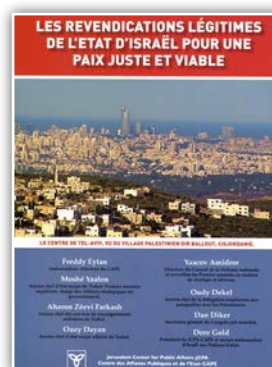
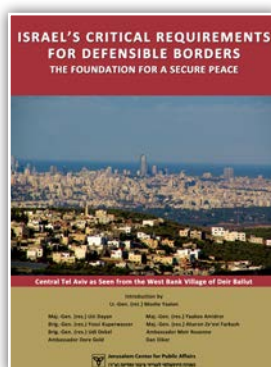
The latest update by Ambassador Gold and Brig.-Gen. Kuperwasser, in the wake of military operations and new threats from Gaza, Lebanon, Syria, and Iran, highlights the vital importance of Israeli control of the aerial and ground dimensions of the West Bank, and the risks entailed for Israel by the stationing of an international force as a lesson from recent history.

“It was important to define defensible borders in the Israeli context as such borders that allow Israel to effectively defend itself by itself, at any time, against all potential military threats from near and far, including those emanating from within the territory Israel controls,” Kuperwasser said.



Earlier versions of the Jerusalem Center’s research on Israel’s Need for Defensible Borders have also appeared in Spanish, French, German, Chinese, and Hebrew. A Jerusalem Center video on Israel’s Need for Defensible Borders has been translated into Hebrew, Chinese, French, Spanish, Portuguese, Persian, Hungarian, German and Russian. Jerusalem Center delegations visited Berlin, London and Washington to discuss the importance of defensible borders and the danger of imposing on Israel the 1967 lines.

Encouraging Saudi Arabia to Join the Abraham Accords

On October 14, 2021, Dore Gold published an article in the British commentary and news outlet *Reaction.life* entitled, “Today, Saudi Arabia is Part of the Solution,” providing perspective on developments within the Kingdom. It was read by Saudi figures in the highest positions. In it, Gold states:

Twenty years ago in Saudi Arabia, there were huge multinational charities propagating an extreme form of Islam. I wrote a *New York Times* bestseller, *Hatred's Kingdom*, which presented the evidence on Saudi funding of Hamas from captured documents. How much Saudi money is going to Hamas in 2021? The answer is “zero.” In fact, Saudi Arabia is not giving a dime to any of the terrorist organizations.

On November 18, 2021, the Jerusalem Center released a video version of this outreach effort to Saudi Arabia - Today Saudi Arabia Is Part of the Solution - as one of the videos in its Genesis Prize “Speak Out for #Israel” campaign.

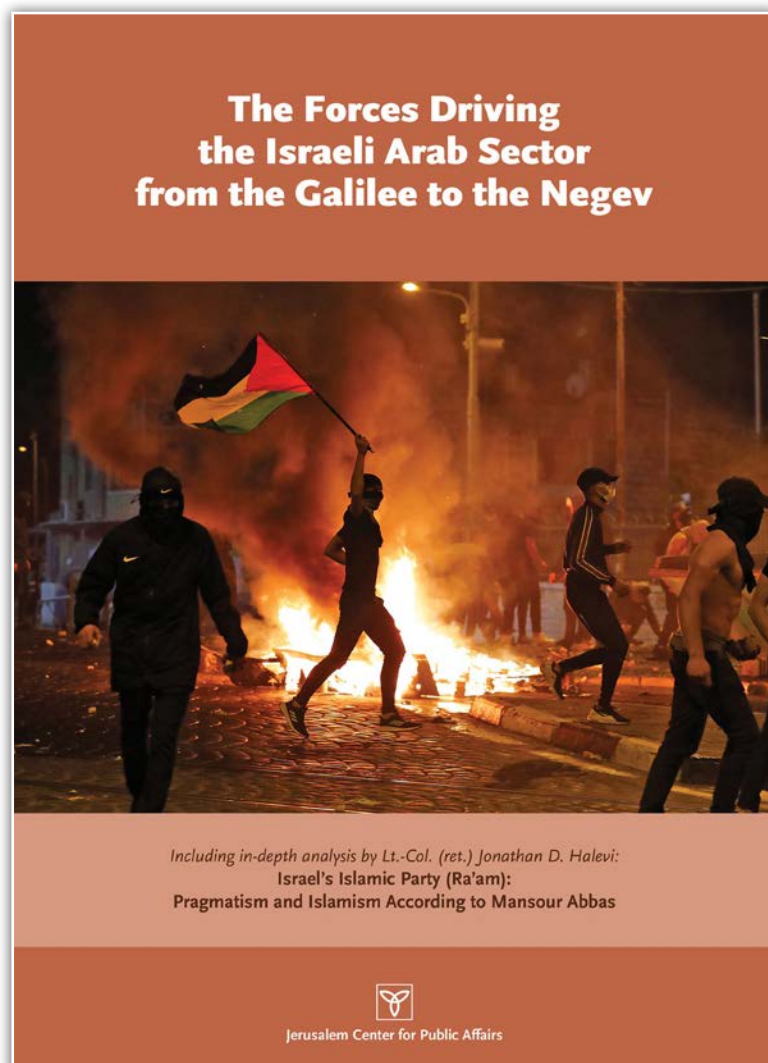

An In-Depth Analysis of the Israeli Arab Riots of May 2021

The May 2021 war with Hamas in Gaza was accompanied by violent riots in mixed Israeli cities (including Acre, Jaffa, Haifa, Lod, and Ramla), in Arab population centers in the Galilee, the Triangle, the center of the country, and the Negev. They were the most widespread disturbances of this type since the founding of the State of Israel. New research by the Jerusalem Center analyzes in depth the factors that led to this wave of violence, its leadership, and its participants.

Why Israel Refuses to Cooperate with the UN Commission of Inquiry

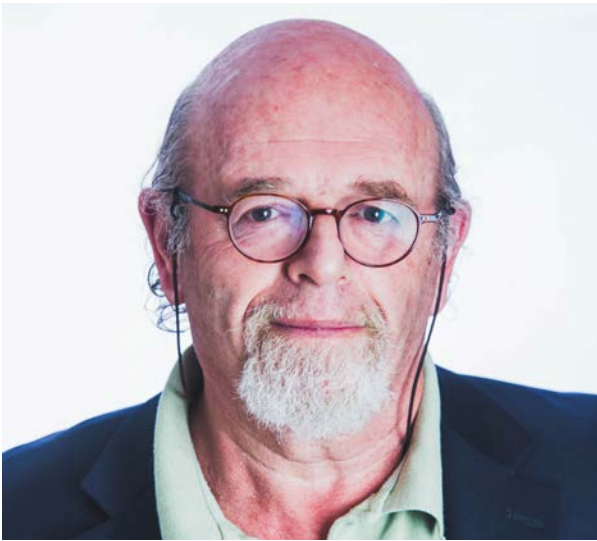

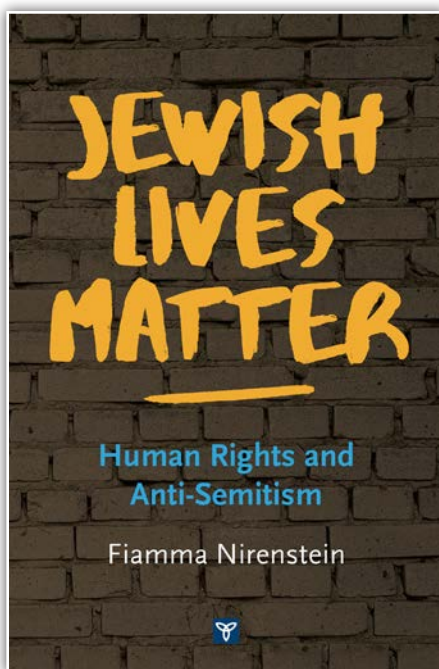

Europe could soon be on the receiving end of Iranian missiles



Will the new Iran nuclear deal endure? Not if history is anything to go by

As Iranian and Western negotiators edge closer to reaching an agreement on Iran's nuclear future, many commentators will be asking themselves a similar question. Will a new deal endure and provide stability for the Middle East and the world?

As always, the key factor when determining whether an arms control treaty will actually work is the readiness of both parties to stick to its terms. Here, recent history does not bode well. Back in March 2004, inspectors from the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) discovered that at a nuclear site in Iran, known as Lavantashan, six buildings had been dismantled and the earth in the area dug out to a depth of about two metres. Tehran had committed itself to allowing inspections under an IAEA safeguards agreement. Yet the apparent purpose of the removal of this dirt was to make it more difficult, if not impossible, to obtain radioactive samples.

A great deal has changed since 2004, and not for the better. True, the P5+1 powers (China, France, Russia, the UK and US, plus Germany) concluded a nuclear agreement with Iran in 2015, the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), which was left unsigned. This deal suffered from a number of notable blind spots – particularly its failure to cover Iranian missiles or any delivery systems. In the past, when the UN drafted resolutions covering weapons of mass destruction in Iraq, they required that ballistic missiles beyond the range of 150km had to be removed or destroyed under international supervision. Missiles of this range were prohibited outright; they could not be manufactured or

numbers and quality, including the range and accuracy of its missile force. Today, even before it perfects a deliverable nuclear weapon, Iran is already altering the balance of power in the region, as demonstrated by the January 2020 Iranian attack against US troops at the Ayn al-Asad airbase in western Iraq, which left around 110 US servicemen with brain injuries. Iranian proxy forces, such as Yemen's Houthis movement, have unleashed repeated strikes in the past three years at the heart of the Saudi capital, Riyadh, using ballistic missiles and drones. The outgoing commander of the US central command, General Kenneth McKenzie, issued a statement in mid-March saying that Iran now had 3,000 ballistic missiles. These, he argued, had become the greatest threat to Middle Eastern security. Moreover

Iran's proxy, Hizbollah, had acquired nearly 150,000 rockets. Supporters of the deal argued that reaching some agreement over its nuclear capabilities would help moderate Iran's overall behaviour. But this proposition was soon tested with the conclusion of the JCPOA in 2015. In the event, the exact opposite occurred. According to one British study, after 2015, the number of militant Shiite militias rapidly increased. The Middle East became far more dangerous. The removal of Western economic sanctions prepared the groundwork for funding militias across the region, especially in Iraq, Syria and Yemen,

likely to empower that network to conduct more attacks since it reintroduces a degree of impunity to IRGC actions, even when they are incontrovertibly acts of terror. Earlier this year, the IRGC took credit for a rocket attack targeting the US Consulate in the northern Iraqi city of Erbil, launched with a dozen Iranian rockets. The IRGC's role should not have come as a surprise. It has been a pivotal player in some of the worst Iranian-backed strikes since it was formed not long after the Islamic Revolution in 1979.

The IRGC had a role to play in the attack by Shiite militants in Beirut in 1983, when the US Marine Corps barracks was bombed and 241 US servicemen lost their lives. It was also instrumental in organising the 1996 attack on Khobar Towers in Saudi Arabia that killed US Air Force personnel. Its role has become global, extending well beyond the Middle East. In 2005, its partner, Hizbollah, was caught stockpiling explosives on the outskirts of London.

One of the legacies of the 9/11 attacks was to alert the West to the dangers emanating from Sunni organisations such as al-Qaeda. Yet through the work of the IRGC, a powerful Shiite militancy is also spreading, promulgated by Iran. This cannot be overlooked.

The ongoing negotiations between the West and Iran will undoubtedly influence Tehran's power projection capabilities in the future. Without some major change in Iranian intentions towards Western states, European countries are not likely to remain merely political rivals. They could soon become the very real targets of Iran's increasingly robust missile forces.
